## <u>MEMO</u>

Date:		
A child who is on chemotherapy or has been on chemotherapy in the last six months and present		
to the Emergency Department with a single temperature of 38.3° C orally (37.8° underarm) or a		
temperature of 38° C orally (37.5° underarm) taken on two occasions at least one hour apart. (The temperature taken by parents at home must be counted).		
MUST BE CONSIDERED AS A MEDICAL EMERGENCY:		
PLEASE DO:		
1.	CBC and differential immediately. This may be do	ne by a finger puncture.
2.	Septic work up (Must include blood cultures from central line)	
3.	If absolute neutrophil count is less than $0.5 \times 10^9/L$ Start on IV antibiotics within 1 hour of arrival a hospital.	
These parents have been instructed <u>NOT</u> to give Tylenol prior to coming to the hospital. If a child is neutropenic, Acetaminophen should not be given unless the child is receiving antibiotics		
When children are receiving chemotherapy, they must <u>NOT</u> be given anything rectally, including medication (Acetaminophen). They also must <u>NOT</u> have temperature taken rectally. They must <u>NOT</u> be given any NSAID such as Aspirin or Advil.
